Alabama Network of Family Resource Centers (ANFRC): \$25,000

ANFRC requests funds to continue its support of this highly effective model used by its local center members. Since ACJF's investment in 2012 ANFRC has grown, along with its impact and the number of members serving families. The network provides training and technical assistance to help communities develop FRCs and to strengthen the work of the existing FRCs, collaboration with state level agencies on behalf of local FRCs, grant writing for services provided by FRCs, statewide education of the collective impact of FRCs. ANFRC has also expanded the financial support for local centers.

Kid One Transport, Inc.: \$17,500

Kid One's mission is to transport children and expectant mothers with limited or no means of transportation to non-emergency medical services. Funding for Kid One will expand their services into Randolph County. According to the Kids Count Data book, 26.6% of expectant mothers in Randolph County did not receive adequate prenatal care and there is currently no hospital providing OB service in Randolph County. Kid One's goal is to provide 200 transports in Randolph County during the first full project year. As of 2015, Kid One has expanded their services and are now in 43 counties and provided over 317,000 transports since its inception in 1997.

The Healthy Minds Network (HMN): \$35,000

The purpose of the Healthy Minds network is to develop a coordinated and effective mental health system in the River Region which will ultimately provide a continuum of care and treatment for the mentally ill.

This grant will come at a particularly critical period in this process and enable this collaborative process to move forward toward the establishment of an onsite mental health center that will provide law enforcement and others options rather than jail in critical care situations. This is a model program for our state.

Sight Savers America (SSA): \$25,000

SSA's mission is to identify and secure treatment for unmet vision and health needs that impede a child's ability to reach their full potential in school and in life. SSA operates four programs that fulfill this mission. Funding for SSA will support their KidCheck Plus health screening program in North Alabama's seventeen (17) counties. KidCheck is a comprehensive school-based screening program that serves over 20,000 preschool – 12th grade students in underserved parts of Alabama each year.
